Tutman Fund Solutions Limited ("TFSL"), the Authorised Corporate Director ("ACD") of SVS AllianceBernstein UK OEIC ("the Company"), is pleased to present the Annual Report and audited Financial Statements of the Company for the year 1 March 2025 to 28 February 2026.

Authorised Status

SVS AllianceBernstein UK OEIC ("the Company") is an Open-Ended Investment Company ("OEIC") with variable capital ("ICVC"). The Company is incorporated in England and Wales under registered number IC004565 and authorised by the Financial Conduct Authority ("FCA") pursuant to Regulation 14 of the OEIC Regulations with effect from 15 March 2019. The Company has an unlimited duration.

Shareholders are not liable for the debts of the Company.

The Head Office of the Company is at Exchange Building, St John's Street, Chichester, West Sussex, PO19 1UP.

Structure of the Company

The Company is an umbrella structure comprised of six Sub-funds as of year end. From time to time, additional Sub-funds may be established by the ACD with the approval of the FCA. On the introduction of any new Sub-fund, the Company's prospectus will be updated setting out the relevant details of each Sub-fund.

The Company comprises of six Sub-funds:

- SVS AllianceBernstein Concentrated US Equity Fund;
- SVS AllianceBernstein Europe (Ex UK) Equity Fund;
- SVS AllianceBernstein Low Volatility Global Equity Fund;
- SVS AllianceBernstein Sustainable Global Equity Fund;
- SVS AllianceBernstein Sustainable US Equity Fund and
- SVS AllianceBernstein Strategic Bond Fund.

All Sub-funds are UCITS ("Undertaking Collective Investment in Transferable Securities") schemes as defined under the FCA's Sourcebook. They are referenced as UK UCITS under the regulatory framework post Brexit. Additional Sub-funds may be added at the ACD's discretion.

The assets of each Sub-fund will be treated as separate from those of every other Sub-fund and will be invested in accordance with the investment objective and investment policy applicable to that Sub-fund. The investment of assets by each Sub-fund must comply with the FCA's Collective Investment Schemes Sourcebook ("COLL") and the investment objective and policy of each of the relevant Sub-funds as stated in the prospectus.

Under the requirements of UCITS V and the UCITS Remuneration Code, TFSL, as ACD and UCITS Manager, must establish and apply remuneration policies and practices for its staff that have a material impact on the risk profile of the ACD or the Sub-funds.

These practices must be consistent with and promote sound and effective risk management, not encourage risk taking which is inconsistent with the risk profile of the Sub-fund as detailed in the instrument of each Sub-fund or the prospectus and does not impair TFSL compliance with its duty to act in the best interest of each Sub-funds it manages.

Under the UCITS Remuneration Code, TFSL are required to disclose how those individuals whose actions have a material impact on the Sub-funds are remunerated (see page 150).

The Company has no Directors other than the ACD.

The Financial Stability Board ('FSB') created the Task Force on Climate-related Financial Disclosures ('TCFD') to improve and increase reporting of climate-related financial information. TFSL have produced TCFD reports in compliance with the FCA's rules on climate-related financial disclosures. The TCFD Product report is an annual report designed to help you understand the impact the Company has on the climate and equally how climate change could influence the performance of the Company. The report will also give you the ability to compare a range of climate metrics with other funds. Important Events During the Year

The ACD changed name from Evelyn Partners Fund Solutions Limited ("EPFL") to Tutman Fund Solutions Limited ("TFSL") on 30th June 2025.

The SVS AllianceBernstein Strategic Bond Fund was launched on 28 May 2025.

SVS AllianceBernstein Concentrated US Equity Fund I Income and Accumulation share classes reduced the Investment Management Fee from 0.75% to 0.70% on 1 August 2025.

SVS AllianceBernstein Sustainable Global Equity Fund launched S Hedged Accumulation and Income Hedged share classes on 15 December 2025.

Effective 1 April 2025, the investment objectives and policies of the SVS AllianceBernstein Sustainable Global Equity Fund and SVS AllianceBernstein Sustainable US Equity Fund changed to include updated disclosures, enabling the adoption of the FCA's new 'Sustainability Focus' investment label.

Important Events After the Year End

On 1 April 2026 an updated Prospectus was made available.

SVS AllianceBernstein Sustainable US Equity Fund E Income and Accumulation share classes reduced the Investment Management Fee from 0.45% to 0.40% on 1 April 2026.

TFSL, acting as ACD, has arranged to transfer the responsibilities of Transfer Agent in-house. As a result, TFSL will cease using FNZ TA Services Limited and will provide these services internally. The change will come into effect on 29 June 2026.

Base Currency:

The base currency of the Company and each Sub-fund is Pounds Sterling.

Share Capital:

The minimum share capital of the Company is £1 and the maximum is £100,000,000,000. Shares in the Company have no par value. The share capital of the Company at all times equals the aggregate net asset value of each Sub-fund.

Minimum Investment:

The minimum initial lump sum investment is £1,000 for Share Class I income and accumulation, £5,000,000 for Share Class F income and accumulation, £50,000,000 for Share Class S income and accumulation and £20,000,000 for Share Class Z income and accumulation. The subsequent minimum investment is £500 for each share class.

Cross Holdings:

There were no cross holdings between Sub-funds in the Company as at 28 February 2026.

Going Concern

The Directors are of the opinion that it is appropriate to continue to adopt the going concern basis in the preparation of the accounts, accordingly the Company has adequate financial resources to continue in operational existence for a period of twelve months from when the Financial Statements are authorised for issue. Further, appropriate accounting policies, consistently applied and supported by reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates, have been used in the preparation of these Financial Statements and applicable accounting standards have been followed.

As ACD, TFSL regularly monitor the liquidity profile of the Sub-funds managed under the Company in both normal and stressed scenarios to ensure the Sub-funds maintain adequate liquidity to meet potential investor requirements in line with fund documentation.

The Directors continue to closely monitor the market impact of global events such as the regional and global conflicts, and although these events may impact the performance of the Company, based on the Directors analysis of these events, they remain of the opinion that adequate financial resources and business continuity plans are in place for the Company to continue as a going concern.

Accounting Policies and Financial Instruments

For the year ended 28 February 2026

1. General Information

The Company is an open-ended investment company and was incorporated under the laws of England and Wales. The address of the ACD is the Exchange Building, St John's Street, Chichester, West Sussex, PO19 1UP.

2. Accounting basis and policies

(a) Basis of accounting

The Financial Statements have been prepared under the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of investments and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 and the Statement of Recommended Practice ("SORP") for Authorised Funds issued by the Investment Association in May 2014 and amended in June 2017.

These Financial Statements are prepared on a going concern basis. The ACD has made an assessment of the Sub-funds' ability to continue as a going concern, and is satisfied they have the resources to continue in business for the foreseeable future and is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt on this assessment. This assessment covers a period of 12 months from the date of issue of these Financial Statements and considers liquidity, declines in global capital markets, known redemption levels, expense projections, key service provider's operational resilience, and the market impact of global events such as the regional and global conflicts.

(b) Gains and losses on investments

Gains and losses on investments held by the Sub-funds are taken to the capital account.

(c) Recognition of revenue

Dividends on quoted equities and preference shares are recognised when the securities are quoted ex-dividend. Dividends received include any withholding taxes but exclude attributable tax credits. Dividends from Real Estate Investment Trusts ("REITs") are recognised as distributable revenue when the securities are quoted ex-dividend.

Dividends received from US Real Estate Investment Trusts ("US REITs") are recognised as revenue when the security is quoted ex-dividend. An assessment of capital/income split is performed, based on prior year dividend announcement for each security. The capital element of the dividend is reallocated to the capital of the fund. Subsequently, when the capital/income split is announced for the dividend a final assessment is performed to determine the correct distribution to shareholders.

Interest on bank and other cash deposits is recognised on an accruals basis.

Dividend revenue from offshore reporting funds is recognised when the securities are quoted ex-dividend. Additional distributable revenue from offshore reporting funds is recognised when declared, and treated as revenue for taxation and distribution purposes.

Overseas withholding tax recoverable amounts previously written off are recognised as a contingent asset when an inflow of economic benefit becomes probable. The potential recovery of overseas withholding tax will be recognised as revenue in the financial statements when it becomes virtually certain that an inflow of economic benefit will arise.

Returns on derivative transactions have been treated as either revenue or capital depending on the motives and circumstances on acquisition.

(d) Treatment of stock and special dividends

The ordinary element of stock dividends received in lieu of cash dividends is credited to capital in the first instance followed by a transfer to revenue of the cash equivalent being offered and this forms part of the distributable revenue. In the case of an enhanced stock dividend, the value of the enhancement is treated as capital and does not form part of the distribution.

Special dividends are reviewed on a case by case basis in determining whether the dividend is to be treated as revenue or capital. Amounts recognised as revenue will form part of the distributable revenue. The tax treatment follows the treatment of the principal amount.

(e) Treatment of expenses

Expenses are recorded on an accruals basis but the Sub-funds may incur additional allowable expenses which are charged as and when incurred.

An ACD expense rebate is applied at the ACD's discretion to maintain each Sub-fund's ongoing charges figure at a level considered appropriate. Any ACD expense rebates received which are directly attributable to transactions costs are taken to the capital account.

The ACD expense rebate also has the effect of increasing the distribution payable to shareholders.

(f) Allocation of revenue and expenses to multiple share classes and Sub-funds

Any revenue or expenses not directly attributable to a particular Share class or Sub-fund will be allocated pro-rata to the net assets of the relevant share classes and Sub-funds.

(g) Taxation

The charge for taxation is based at the current rate on taxable revenue for the year less allowable expenses.

Where tax has been deducted from revenue, that tax can, in some instances, be off set against the corporation tax payable, by way of double tax relief.

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method for all timing differences arising from the treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes, calculated at the rate at which it is anticipated the timing differences will reverse. Deferred tax assets are recognised only when, on the basis of available evidence, it is more likely than not that there will be taxable profits in the future against which the deferred tax asset can be offset.

(h) Distribution policy

The net revenue after taxation, as disclosed in the Financial Statements is distributable to shareholders as dividend distributions. Any revenue deficit is deducted from capital.

The ACD will pay all revenue less expenses charged to revenue and taxation as a final distribution at the end of the annual accounting period.

Revenue attributable to accumulation shareholders is retained at the end of each distribution period and represents a reinvestment of revenue.

(i) Basis of valuation of investments

Listed investments are valued at close of business bid prices, on the last business day of the accounting period.

Market value is defined by the SORP as fair value which is the bid value of each security.

Unlisted or suspended investments are valued by AllianceBernstein Limited ("the Investment Manager") taking into account, where appropriate, latest dealing prices, valuations from reliable sources, financial performance and other relevant factors. No unlisted or suspended investments were held as at the year end.

The fair value of derivative instruments is mark to market value. The forward currency contracts are valued at the prevailing forward exchange rates.

(j) Exchange rates

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded in Sterling at the rate ruling at the date of the transactions. Assets and liabilities expressed in foreign currencies on the last business day of the accounting period are translated into Sterling at the closing mid market exchange rates ruling on that date.

(k) Dilution adjustment

In order to counter the effects of dilution on a Sub-funds' Net Asset Value ("NAV") brought about by large purchases and/or redemptions of a Sub-funds' shares, the ACD has implemented a swing pricing policy.

Dilution involves a reduction in the NAV brought about by investors purchasing, selling and/or exchanging in and out of a Sub-fund at a price that does not reflect the dealing costs associated with the Sub-fund's trade activity undertaken to accommodate the corresponding cash inflows or outflows. Dilution occurs when the actual cost of purchasing or selling the underlying assets of a Sub-fund deviates from the valuation of these assets in the Sub-fund due to dealing charges, taxes and any spread between the buying and selling prices of the underlying assets. Dilution may have an adverse effect on the value of a Sub-fund and therefore impact shareholders.

Under the ACD's swing pricing policy, if on any Business Day, the aggregate net investor inflows or outflows in shares of a Sub-fund exceed a pre-determined threshold, as determined from time to time by the ACD, then the NAV of the Sub-funds may be adjusted upwards or downwards to reflect the costs attributable to such net inflows or net outflows. The threshold is set by the ACD, who takes into account factors such as the prevailing market conditions, the estimated dilution costs and the size of the Sub-fund. The level of swing pricing adjustment will be reviewed and may be adjusted on a periodic basis to reflect an approximation of dealing costs as determined by the ACD. The application of swing pricing will be triggered automatically on a daily basis upon crossing the relevant threshold. The swing pricing adjustment will be applicable to all shares of each Sub-fund (and all transactions) on that Business Day. The swing pricing adjustment may vary by each Sub-fund and is dependent upon the particular assets in which a Sub-fund is invested. The swing pricing adjustment will generally not exceed 2% of the original NAV of each Sub-fund.

Investors are advised that the application of swing pricing may result in increased volatility in a Sub-fund's valuation and performance, and a Sub-fund's NAV may deviate from the underlying investments' performance on a particular Business Day as a result of the application of swing pricing. Typically, such adjustment will increase the Net Asset Value per share on a given Business Day when there are net inflows into the Sub-fund and decrease the NAV per share when there are net outflows.

(l) Equalisation

An income equalisation amount representing the value of income attributable to the shares accrued since the record date for the last income distribution for income shares or deemed distribution for accumulation shares is included in the price of shares and so reflected as a capital sum in the price. Being capital, it is not liable to income tax but must be deducted from the cost of shares for capital gains tax purposes.

For accumulation shares, the equalisation amount is reinvested alongside the taxed income. This means that no adjustment need be made to the cost of the shares in calculating the relevant capital gains tax.

Equalisation only applies to shares purchased during the relevant accounting period. It is the average amount of income included in the price of all shares issued during that period.

(m) Derivatives

Sub-funds may enter into permitted transactions such as derivative contracts or forward foreign currency transactions. Where the transactions are used to protect or enhance capital, the gains/losses are treated as capital and included within gains/losses on investments in the Statement of Total Return. Any open positions in these types of transactions at the period end are included in the Balance Sheet at their mark to market value.

Where derivative positions generate total returns it will generally be appropriate to apportion such returns between capital and revenue to properly reflect the nature of the transaction.

3. Derivatives and other financial instruments**Risk management process**

The ACD has adopted a risk management process that takes account of the investment objectives and policies of the Sub-funds which enables the ACD to monitor and measure as frequently as appropriate the risk of a Sub-funds' positions and their contribution to the overall risk profile of each Sub-fund.

A Sub-fund may not enter into a derivative position which would result in the Sub-fund's global exposure exceeding the net value of its Scheme Property. The ACD will calculate the global exposure of each Sub-fund on at least a daily basis taking into account the current value of the underlying assets, the counterparty risk, future market movements and the time available to liquidate the positions.

The ACD will use the commitment approach for calculating the Sub-fund's global exposure.

Risks

All investments in the Company involve risk. Potential investors should consider the following risk factors before investing in the Company and a corresponding Sub-fund.

The risk descriptions below correspond to some of the main risk factors for the Company and each Sub-fund.

The risks of some of Sub-funds may be comparatively high. A Sub-fund could potentially be affected by risks beyond those listed for it or described here and these risk descriptions themselves are not intended to be exhaustive.

The investments of each Sub-fund are subject to market fluctuations and other risks inherent in investing in securities. The value of investments and the income derived from them may fall as well as rise and investors may not recoup the original amount they invested in a Sub-fund. There is no certainty that the investment objective of a Sub-fund will actually be achieved. The ACD does not guarantee any yield or return on capital in any Sub-fund.

The risks indicated below are the main risks for which the Company's holdings of financial instruments are exposed.

(a) Market risks**Currency risk**

To the extent that a Sub-fund holds assets that are denominated in currencies other than the base currency, any changes in currency exchange rates could reduce investment gains or income, or increase investment losses, in some cases significantly.

The ACD seeks to manage the portfolio exposure to currency movements by using forward currency contracts. The forward currency contracts are shown in the Portfolio of Investments.

Interest rate risk

For bank deposits and for money market instruments and other short-maturity investments, changes in interest rates can be expected to cause investment yields to rise or fall. As the majority of each Sub-fund's financial assets are non-interest bearing, the risk is not considered significant and is therefore not disclosed.

Other price risk

The risk that the value of Sub-funds' financial instruments will fluctuate as a result of changes in prices caused by factors other than interest rate or currency movement. Other price risk arises primarily from uncertainty about the future prices of financial instruments that the Sub-funds hold.

Market risk is considered on a daily basis and forms the foundation of investment oversight analysis by the ACD. This can include (but is not limited to) the analysis of factors such as a Sub-fund's concentration; style, geographical, industry and market capitalisation biases; active, systematic and specific risk measurements; active money; and beta characteristics.

(b) Liquidity risk

Each Sub-fund's investments may be subject to liquidity constraints, which means that the investments may trade infrequently and in small volumes, or that a particular instrument is difficult to buy or sell. Normally liquid investments may also be subject to periods of disruption in difficult market conditions. As a result, changes in the value of investments may be unpredictable and, in certain circumstances, it may be difficult to deal an investment at the latest market price quoted or at a value considered by the ACD to be fair.

The overall liquidity profile for each Sub-fund is independently reviewed by the ACD. The liquidity profile takes into account investment, cashflow and market liquidity considerations.

Investment liquidity considerations include an assessment of asset class liquidity conditions, liquidity of underlying holdings, portfolio construction and position level and sectoral concentration, the scale of individual stock ownership and the nature of the investment strategy.

Market (or distribution-related) considerations include an assessment of asset demand, Sub-funds growth, client concentration and the persistency of the client base. Supplementary to this, market liquidity stress tests are carried out on a monthly basis for each Sub-fund.

(c) Derivatives risk

The Company permits the use of derivatives for investment purposes by each Sub-fund.

Sub-funds may invest in derivatives for the purposes of hedging and in accordance with the principles of Efficient Portfolio Management ("EPM").

Sub-funds' use of hedging, EPM, borrowing, cash holding and stock lending and is not intended to significantly raise the risk profile of the Sub-funds or increase its volatility.

Sub-funds' ability to use derivatives may be limited by market conditions, regulatory limits and tax considerations. Any income or capital generated will be paid to the Sub-funds. Use of derivatives can expose the Scheme Property to a higher degree of risk. For example:

1. the effect of gearing, relatively small market movements can result in disproportionately high levels of loss;
2. off exchange transactions can carry higher levels of risk due to lack of liquidity, difficulty in valuing the investment and determining a fair price;
3. Sub-funds can be exposed to counterparty risk through counterparty default or insolvency. The use of one or more separate counterparties will be made to undertake derivative transactions on behalf of the Sub-funds. The Sub-funds may be required to pledge or transfer collateral paid from within the assets of the relevant Sub-fund to secure such contracts entered into including in relation to derivatives and stock lending. There may be a risk that a counterparty will wholly or partially fail to honour their contractual arrangements under the arrangement with regards the return of collateral and any other payments due to the relevant Sub-fund;
4. Sub-funds' ability to settle derivative contracts on maturity may be affected by the level of liquidity in the underlying asset;
5. in adverse situations, Sub-funds' use of derivatives may become ineffective in hedging or EPM and Sub-funds may suffer significant loss as a result.

The SVS AllianceBernstein Europe (Ex UK) Equity Fund, SVS AllianceBernstein Low Volatility Global Equity Fund, SVS AllianceBernstein Sustainable Global Equity Fund and SVS AllianceBernstein Strategic Bond Fund are using derivatives for investment purposes and EPM.

The ACD and Investment Manager measure the creditworthiness of counterparties as part of the risk management process. The counterparties of these transactions will be highly rated financial institutions specialising in these types of transactions and approved by the Investment Manager.

(d) Management risk

Sub-funds may be subject to management risk because it is an actively managed investment fund. When managing Sub-funds and applying investment techniques and risk analyses, the Investment Manager's assessment of market or economic trends, their choice or design of any software models they use, their allocation of assets, or other decisions regarding how the Sub-funds' assets will be invested cannot be guaranteed to ensure returns on investments.

(e) Counterparty and custody risk

An entity with which Sub-funds trade or do business, such as temporary or long-term custody of the Sub-funds assets, could become insolvent, unwilling, or unable to meet its obligations to the Sub-funds resulting in payments owed to the Sub-funds being delayed, reduced, or eliminated. To minimize this risk, the ACD carefully selected financially strong and well-established counterparties following a thorough due diligence review process.

Investment Manager's Report

Investment Objective

To achieve an increase in the value of its investment over a rolling 5 year period after the deduction of all fees, through an actively managed, concentrated, high conviction portfolio of shares in US companies.

Investment Policy

The Sub-fund seeks to achieve its investment objective by investing at least 80% of the Sub-fund's total value in shares of US companies. A "US company" means any company that is organised in or has substantial business activities in the United States of America.

Investment can be direct or indirect, in shares (including common and preference shares), rights for shares, warrants, and depositary receipts (securities issued by banks that represent company shares). Indirect exposure may be achieved through investment in Collective Investment Schemes.

The Sub-fund will be concentrated (investing in 15 to 25 companies) and the Investment Manager's investment decisions are not restricted to any specific market, industry sector or company size, meaning that the Investment Manager will invest in a relatively small number of companies when compared to the number of companies available for investment (a "High Conviction" approach).

Companies are chosen for their specific growth and business characteristics, consistent revenue and earnings growth potential, financial position and experienced management. The Investment Manager uses a bottom-up selection process to identify, analyse and invest in companies that the Investment Manager considers of the highest quality (companies with the potential to generate consistent earnings growth and outperform the market over the long-term).

The Sub-fund is actively managed meaning the Investment Manager uses their expertise to select investments to achieve the Sub-fund's objectives.

The Investment Manager will include, as part of its overall investment process, Environmental, Social, and Governance ("ESG") factors and consider whether or not to invest in or sell particular shares. The Investment Manager is not restricted by the investment policy from holding a particular company, unless the company is identified in accordance with the Sub-fund's Exclusion Policy as stated in Appendix 4 of the Prospectus.

The Investment Manager engages with companies as part of their fundamental research process and will continue to take an active stewardship role by engaging with companies and actively voting in relation to shares held by the Sub-fund once it has invested.

The Sub-fund may also invest up to 20% of its value in money market instruments, deposits, cash and near cash, and up to 10% of its value in collective investment schemes (including other funds managed by the Investment Manager or its affiliates).

The Sub-fund may also use derivatives for efficient portfolio management or hedging purposes.

Any investment in derivatives for efficient portfolio management will not give rise to any leverage and is not intended to increase the Sub-fund's risk profile.

Investment Manager's Report

For the year ended 28 February 2026

SVS AllianceBernstein Concentrated US Equity Fund

Investment Review

During the 12-month period ending 28 February 2026, Class I shares of the SVS AllianceBernstein Concentrated US Equity Fund decreased in absolute terms but underperformed the S&P 500, which rose 9.15% (net of fees and in GBP terms). Both security and sector selection had a negative impact on relative performance. Security selection within technology and industrials detracted the most, while selection within consumer staples and real estate contributed. In terms of sector allocation, an underweight to communication services detracted, while an underweight to consumer staples contributed. Leading (held) detractors from absolute performance included Roper Technologies, Gartner and Arthur J. Gallagher. In contrast, top (held) absolute contributors were Amphenol, NVIDIA and Eaton.

Our investment philosophy is based on the conviction that long-term, consistent earnings growth drives long-term investment returns. We believe steadily growing look-through earnings power can be a powerful offset to market volatility driven by multiple expansion and contraction. We invest in highly liquid, publicly traded equity securities of quality companies, with a focus on non-cyclical businesses that offer high predictability. We adopt a holding company mentality, targeting quality businesses with a minimum of five years of positive earnings visibility, proven management teams, and trading at a discount to their anticipated future valuations. Our valuation methodology, honed through extensive experience, involves modeling companies' future earnings over five years, assigning a valuation to those earnings based on their relative growth, and discounting that valuation back to current terms using discount rates that reflect individual stocks' different risk factors. This allows us to appraise stocks on a reasonable, like-for-like basis. Our "holding company" approach typically results in low portfolio turnover, with most returns expected to be realized as long-term capital gains. While our average holding period is three years, we are prepared to make changes as necessary.

Market Overview

US equities, as measured by the S&P 500, rose during the 12-month period ended 28 February 2026. Global markets were volatile early in 2025 following US president Donald Trump's back-and-forth announcements on tariffs in April. After trade tensions eased, global stocks rallied over the summer, despite uncertainty over future Federal Reserve rate cuts. The Fed clarified its shifting focus to labor market weakness in August and subsequently lowered interest rates three times in the second half of 2025. Concerns over technology stock valuations, prompted by uncertainty over AI-related spending and potential disruption to enterprise-software businesses, began to weigh on US markets at the end of 2025 as investors rotated into value-oriented sectors and non-US markets to diversify from large-cap technology. Many developed-market indices reached new all-time highs early in 2026, but a rise in geopolitical and trade-related tensions also increased volatility. Within large-cap markets, both growth and value stocks rose in absolute terms, with value outperforming on a relative basis. Both large- and small-cap stocks increased in absolute terms, with small caps outperforming on a relative basis.

Outlook

We believe the investment backdrop remains compelling, with potentially accelerating fundamental economic growth. Our Fund earnings growth looks attractive in relative and absolute terms. With the P/E compression we have faced in the last few years, we believe the Fund is unlikely to face more compression—meaning above market earnings growth could be reflected in better Fund returns. We understand the last few years have been disappointing for our Strategy, but we continue to believe our investment approach of over 50 years remains as relevant as ever and earnings outgrowth will be rewarded in the future. We believe the current environment is testing investor patience, not the validity of the Strategy. We have faced pressures such as these in the past and historically investors that have stayed the course have been rewarded.

At the end of February, it was announced that James (Jim) Tierney, Senior Vice President and the Chief Investment Officer of Concentrated US Growth at AB, is retiring at the end of 2026. Starting next month, Jim will be handing over his responsibilities to Michael Walker, his Co-CIO for almost the last year and teammate for the last 17 years. You are in great hands with Michael, and you will hear his voice through future communications.

Investment Objective

To achieve an increase in the value of its investment over a rolling 5 year period after the deduction of all fees through an actively managed, diversified portfolio of shares in European (excluding UK) companies.

Investment Policy

The Sub-fund seeks to meet its investment objective by investing at least 80% of the Sub-fund's total value in shares of European (excluding UK) companies. A "European company" means any company that is organized in or has substantial business activities in Europe. Investment can be direct or indirect, in shares (including common and preference shares), rights for shares, warrants, and depositary receipts (securities issued by banks that represent company shares). Indirect exposure may be achieved through investment in Collective Investment Schemes.

The Sub-fund is actively managed meaning the Investment Manager uses their expertise to select investments to achieve the Sub-fund's objectives.

The Sub-fund will be diversified (investing in at least 30 companies) and the Investment Manager's investment decisions are not restricted to any specific industry sector or company size.

When selecting which companies to invest in and how much, the Investment Manager uses a combination of in-depth research (to develop a view on the ability of a company to meet return targets), an assessment of the downside risks (to estimate a company's potential to decline in value if market conditions change) and the company's contribution to the portfolio's overall risk exposures.

The Investment Manager will include, as part of its overall investment process, Environmental, Social, and Governance ("ESG") factors when considering whether or not to invest in or sell particular shares. The Investment Manager is not restricted by the investment policy from holding a particular company, unless the company is identified in accordance with the Sub-fund's Exclusion Policy as stated in Appendix 4 of the Prospectus.

The Investment Manager engages with companies as part of their fundamental research process and will continue to take an active stewardship role by engaging with companies and actively voting in relation to shares held by the Sub-fund once it has invested.

Although the Sub-fund name states '(Ex UK)', and in-line with the Sub-fund's Investment policy, the Sub-fund may invest in shares of UK companies to achieve its Investment objective. At all times the Sub-fund's investment into UK companies will not exceed 5% of the Sub-fund's net assets.

The Sub-fund may also invest up to 20% of its value in money market instruments, deposits, cash and near cash, and up to 10% of its value in units in collective investment schemes (including other funds managed by the Investment Manager or its affiliates).

The Sub-fund may also use derivatives for investment, efficient portfolio management or hedging purposes. Use of derivatives for investment purposes are limited to currency forwards used to gain exposure to European (ex UK) currencies.

Any investment in derivatives for efficient portfolio management and investment purposes, is not intended to increase the Sub-fund's risk profile.

Investment Review

During the 12-month period ending on 28 February 2026, Class I shares of the SVS AllianceBernstein Europe (ex UK) Equity Fund increased in absolute terms, but underperformed their Benchmark, the MSCI Europe ex UK Index, which rose 22.04% (net of fees and in GBP terms). Security selection detracted from relative returns, while sector selection contributed. Security selection within healthcare and industrials detracted, mitigating contributions from the Fund's overweight to the industrials and technology sectors. The top three (held) individual detractors from performance were Novo Nordisk, SAP and 3I Group, while the top three (held) contributors were ASML, BE Semiconductor Industries and Safran.

The Fund's Management Team, led by Thorsten Winkelmann, continues to use their fundamental research to actively build a high-conviction portfolio of securities of issuers that they believe have the ability to compound high fundamental returns over the long term and that have superior long-term growth characteristics. Companies are chosen for their specific growth and business characteristics, namely structural growth, profitability, a strong financial position and experienced management. Key transactions included adding exposure to Prosus, Ryanair and a leading financial service provider. We also reduced our exposure to ASML, Novo Nordisk and Hermès International.

Investment Manager's Report

Market Overview

European equities, as measured by the MSCI Europe ex UK, rose during the 12-month period ended 28 February 2026. Global markets were volatile early in 2025 following US president Donald Trump's back-and-forth announcements on tariffs in April. After trade tensions eased, global stocks rallied over the summer, despite uncertainty over future Federal Reserve rate cuts. The Fed clarified its shifting focus to labor market weakness in August and subsequently lowered interest rates three times in the second half of 2025. Concerns over technology stock valuations, prompted by uncertainty over AI-related spending and potential disruption to enterprise software businesses, began to weigh on US markets at the end of 2025 as investors rotated into value-oriented sectors and non-US markets to diversify from large-cap technology. Many developed-market indices reached new all-time highs early in 2026, but a rise in geopolitical and trade-related tensions also increased volatility.

Outlook

Quality growth in Europe had a difficult time in 2025—we feel frustrated and disappointed as investors having to put our clients' capital to work every day. As long-term investors, investing in quality, structural growth companies has always been a cornerstone of our strategy. These companies, characterized by high and consistent profitability, durable competitive advantages, robust balance sheets, resilient business models and strong governance, have historically commanded a premium due to their sustainable and visible value creation.

However, the investment landscape in 2025 has presented unique challenges that have tested the conviction of many investors. The market has been marked by a significant shift in investor sentiment, driven by a combination of macroeconomic factors, sectoral rotations and geopolitical uncertainties. Over the past year, European value stocks have outperformed growth and quality stocks by a wide margin, a stark contrast to the previous decade when all three styles delivered similar returns.

Today, quality growth stocks are trading at a discount relative to cyclical growth stocks and at the lowest premium to the broader market seen in nearly two decades. While it is important to acknowledge that valuations can both overshoot and undershoot, we believe the current environment presents a compelling opportunity. The alignment of various factors suggests a brighter future for quality growth companies.

Despite these top-down challenges, the structural growth drivers and resilient business models of quality companies remain intact at a time when valuations look compelling. The current market environment, characterized by heightened uncertainty and valuation anomalies, presents a compelling opportunity for long-term investors. As a team, we build our fundamental conviction through learning about companies and industries.

Ultimately, the key to navigating the challenges of investing in quality, structural growth companies lies in maintaining a long-term perspective. By focusing on the fundamental strengths of these companies and resisting the temptation to react to short-term market fluctuations, we believe investors can position themselves to capitalize on future growth opportunities and benefit from the compounding effect on returns should a recovery occur.

Investment Manager's Report

Investment Objective

To achieve an increase in the value of its investment over a rolling 5 year period after the deduction of all fees, while aiming to have lower volatility than the broad global equity market, as represented by the MSCI World Index and reduce losses when global equity markets decline, through an actively managed, diversified portfolio of shares in global companies.

Investment Policy

The Sub-fund seeks to achieve its investment objective by investing at least 80% of the Sub-fund's total value in shares of global companies. Investment can be direct or indirect, in shares (including common and preference shares), rights for shares, warrants, and depositary receipts (securities issued by banks that represent company shares). Indirect exposure may be achieved through investment in Collective Investment Schemes.

The Sub-fund will invest in shares that the Investment Manager believes to have fundamentally lower volatility (measure of the ups and downs of performance) and less downside risks in the future. The Investment Manager uses its proprietary risk and return models as well as its judgment and experience in managing investment portfolios to construct a diversified portfolio with a balance of quality, stability and price.

The Sub-fund is actively managed meaning the Investment Manager uses their expertise to select investments to achieve the Sub-fund's objectives.

The Sub-fund will be diversified (investing in at least 30 companies) and the Investment Manager's investment decisions are not restricted to any specific market, region, industry sector or company size.

The Investment Manager will include, as part of its overall investment process, Environmental, Social, and Governance ("ESG") factors when considering whether or not to invest in or sell particular shares. The Investment Manager is not restricted by the investment policy from holding a particular company, unless the company is identified in accordance with the Sub-fund's Exclusion Policy as stated in Appendix 4 of the Prospectus.

The Investment Manager engages with companies as part of their fundamental research process and will continue to take an active stewardship role by engaging with companies and actively voting in relation to shares held by the Sub-fund once it has invested.

The Sub-fund may also invest up to 20% of its value in money market instruments, deposits, cash and near cash, and up to 10% of its value in units in collective investment schemes (including other funds managed by the Investment Manager or its affiliates).

The Sub-fund may also use derivatives for investment, efficient portfolio management or hedging purposes. Use of derivatives for investment purposes are limited to currency forwards used to gain exposure to global currencies.

Any investment in derivatives for efficient portfolio management and investment purposes is not intended to increase the Sub-fund's risk profile.

Investment Review

During the 12 month period ending 28 February 2026, Class I shares of the SVS AllianceBernstein Low Volatility Global Equity Fund increased in absolute terms but underperformed their Benchmark, the MSCI World Index, which was up 13.64% (net of fees and in GBP terms). Our Low Volatility Equity Portfolios seek to provide less volatility, with downside risk mitigation driving long term outperformance. During the period, both security and sector selection detracted from relative returns. Security selection within industrials and technology detracted, offsetting contributions from selection within healthcare and consumer staples. Within sector selection, an underweight to materials detracted, while an overweight to technology contributed.

The top three individual stock detractors during the period were Fiserv, Wolters Kluwer and RELX Group. Fiserv shares fell after the company reported earnings that showed the company had misrepresented prior results, and new management slashed growth targets across all segments. Wolters Kluwer and RELX lagged due to generative AI disruption fears and continued headwinds from US dollar weakness.

Investment Manager's Report

Leading contributors to performance included TSMC, Prysmian Group and McKesson. TSMC outperformed AI semiconductor peers due to earnings growth from resilient demand and balance sheet quality, while peers faced policy risk, inventory build up and a moderating AI trade narrative. Prysmian continues to benefit from electrification and energy transition trends. The company's visibility in its Transmission and Power Grid segments is the largest it has ever been, with backlog out to 2029 and utility frame agreements providing support. Free cash flow generation remains strong, allowing the company to grow its Transmission business organically while adding bolt on acquisitions across its other segments. McKesson, a leading pharmaceutical distributor, rose following strong fiscal third quarter results at the beginning of the month. Additionally, the company benefited from investors rotating into sectors outside of tech and becoming more defensive within healthcare.

Fund changes focused on three areas. First, we added to high quality companies with successful business models and strong cash flow generation. Second, we reduced names with higher risk. Finally, we focused on valuation, taking profits in more expensive names and increasing exposure to businesses that offer compelling valuations. Key transactions included adding exposure to OBIC, S&P Global, Cisco and BAE Systems. We also exited our position in Oracle—taking profit during the stock's rally—while trimming shares of Microsoft, ADP and McKesson.

Market Overview

Global equities, as measured by the MSCI World, rose during the 12-month period ended 28 February 2026. Global markets were volatile early in 2025 following US president Donald Trump's back-and-forth announcements on tariffs in April. After trade tensions eased, global stocks rallied over the summer, despite uncertainty over future Federal Reserve rate cuts. The Fed clarified its shifting focus to labor market weakness in August and subsequently lowered interest rates three times in the second half of 2025. Concerns over technology stock valuations, prompted by uncertainty over AI-related spending and potential disruption to enterprise-software businesses, began to weigh on US markets at the end of 2025 as investors rotated into value-oriented sectors and non-US markets to diversify from large-cap technology. Many developed-market indices reached new all-time highs early in 2026, but a rise in geopolitical and trade-related tensions also increased volatility. Within large-cap markets, both growth and value stocks rose in absolute terms, with value outperforming on a relative basis. Both large- and small-cap stocks increased in absolute terms, with small caps outperforming on a relative basis.

Outlook

The downside risks for 2026 stem from persistent inflation, labor market shifts and policy uncertainties, while potential accelerators could include AI adoption, monetary easing and fiscal initiatives, notably in the US and Europe. Japan and China face unique challenges, with Japan tightening policy and China exporting deflation. With the current geopolitical situation, we are continuing to closely monitor developments in energy markets and any signs of escalation that could materially alter the growth or inflation outlook. We are focused on resilient, high-quality companies that can sustain profitability; managing AI-driven volatility while maintaining long-term exposure; and broadening geographic and sector diversification.

In an environment of unprecedented underperformance of quality and minimum volatility stocks, AI driven market dynamics with growing risk of a capex bubble and sluggish macroeconomic growth and US policy uncertainty, we are focused on three areas.

- Focus on quality. Quality companies with consistent profitability and resilient business models tend to outperform over time. High-quality companies can also sustain earnings growth independent of macro conditions. Short-term lapses in quality stock performance don't signal a fundamental erosion of long-term potential. In our view, earnings and cash flows are still the best predictor of equity returns over long-term horizons.
- Focus on managing AI volatility while keeping exposure for long-term returns. Complacency about volatility is a risk following a strong year for equities. US market dynamics and AI controversies could provoke turbulence in 2026. AI's rapid growth may unlock productivity gains and return potential, but transformational technology comes with considerable risks. Today, as the hyperscalers pour hundreds of billions of dollars into infrastructure capex, more questions are being asked about their future return on investment and whether we're in an AI bubble.
- Cast a wider net for long-term return potential. US equities remain expensive versus global peers. Regional diversification isn't just a risk control tool—it's a source of differentiated returns to help fight concentrated leadership.

We believe that equity portfolios designed to smooth volatility are especially appealing in the current market environment. For long-term, outcome-oriented investors, we believe that companies with these features are best positioned to deliver strong returns through changing environments.

The Fund aims to achieve an increase in the value of its investment over a rolling 5 year period after the deduction of all fees.

Sustainability Objective

The Sub-fund's sustainability objective is to positively contribute to environmental and social challenges, by investing in companies that provide solutions to the Sub-fund's sustainability themes (together the "Sustainability Themes") of:

- Climate – companies providing solutions to key global climate objectives including lower carbon emissions, biodiversity and resource preservation, and reduced pollution;
- Health – companies providing solutions to key global health objectives including improved life expectancy, greater health-related quality of life, and reduced disparities of care; and / or
- Empowerment – companies that enable greater economic growth and productivity which may help individuals enjoy more prosperous and fulfilling lives through the provision of solutions which include widening access to previously inaccessible financial systems, communication systems, education and the development of critical social and physical infrastructure.

The Sub-fund seeks to contribute to these fundamental challenges by investing in companies that have revenue assessed to be aligned to one or more of the UN Sustainable Development Goals (UN SDGs) identified by the Investment Manager as contributing to the achievement of the Sustainability Themes.

Material effects of sustainability objective on financial objective or sustainability outcomes

While the Sub-fund's investment strategy may result in a narrower investment universe compared to a fund without a similar sustainability objective, the Investment Manager does not believe that this will have a material effect on the financial risk and return of the Sub-fund or on the Sub-fund's ability to meet its financial investment objective.

The Investment Manager does not consider that pursuing the Sub-fund's sustainability objective will result in material negative environmental and / or social outcomes. While the Investment Manager pursues positive selection criteria, negative environmental and/or social outcomes are mitigated through a number of methodologies:

- The Investment Manager may not invest in a company in the Sub-fund's Exclusion Policy as stated in Appendix 4 of the Prospectus.
- The Investment Manager applies a proprietary framework to assess for material negative environmental and / or social outcomes as explained in "ESG Integration" below.
- The Investment Manager's selection criteria also includes the consideration of ESG risks and opportunities in its fundamental research process as explained in "ESG Integration" below.

The Investment Manager engages with companies as part of their fundamental research process as detailed in "Stewardship" below.

Investment Policy**Primary investment policy**

The Sub-fund seeks to achieve its financial and sustainable investment objectives by investing at least 80% of the Sub-fund's total value in shares of global companies that the Investment Manager has identified as positively contributing to the Sustainability Themes.

This positive contribution requires that companies generate at least 25% of their revenue from the direct provision of products or services aligned with Sustainability Themes, as measured against one or more of the UN SDGs (as detailed below).

The Sub-fund may from time to time also invest (in addition to the 80% investment in Climate, Health and/or Empowerment) in other UN SDG-linked sustainable themes identified through the same methodology. The Sustainability Themes may change over time, and investors will be notified should this occur.

Sustainability standard

What sustainability standard does the Sub-fund use to select assets?

The robust, evidence based standard of sustainability used by the Sub-fund for the purposes of asset selection is a 25% revenue alignment to the UN SDGs.

The UN SDGs comprise 17 goals, broken down into 169 specific sub-targets designed to address key global social and environmental issues. Further information on the UN SDGs can be found at <https://sdgs.un.org/>.

The Investment Manager uses the UN SDGs (and their sub-targets) as the framework for the Sub-fund's absolute standard of sustainability by:

- identifying companies with a UN SDG revenue alignment verifiably mapped to one or more of the Sustainability Themes (as further detailed below); and
- ensuring that no company deriving less than a minimum revenue threshold of 25% from UN SDG aligned activities is included within the investible universe.

Why is this standard of sustainability considered to be appropriate for the Fund?

The UN SDGs were chosen as the basis of the robust evidence-based standard as they directly target the themes specified in the Sub-fund's sustainability objective.

Further, the UN SDGs were adopted by all UN Member States in 2015 and are one of the most internationally recognised and accepted standards and measures of sustainability, and a standard which can be applied consistently across the Sub-fund's main asset class of global equities. Further, the UN SDGs are interconnected, apply to all countries, and require action by all stakeholders – governments, the private sector, civil society, the United Nations system and others.

As a multi-theme portfolio, the 25% threshold for revenue alignment enables the Sub-fund to access a diversified range of companies which might otherwise be inaccessible at a higher revenue threshold. The Investment Manager has determined as a result of its internal research that a minimum revenue percentage of 25% is appropriate on the basis that companies with at least 25% revenue alignment have sufficient management focus on the UN SDG-aligned area of their business to allow them to consistently deliver in line with the Sub-fund's sustainability objective.

This allows for investment into a broader range of themes to include products and services such as emerging technologies or essential services such as access to financial products or food packaging.

How does the Investment Manager map the Sustainability Themes to the UN SDGs?

The Investment Manager assesses and maps the Sustainability Themes against the detailed 169 sub-targets of the UN SDGs, and the Sustainability Themes are therefore not limited to being measured or assessed against any one of the main 17 UN SDGs.

Each of the Sustainability Themes may encompass one or more of the main 17 UN SDGs, and the UN SDGs under consideration in respect of a particular theme may change over time.

As an indication for investors, the following mapping demonstrates the Investment Manager's consideration of how the Sustainability Themes may map to the UN SDGs, together with some examples of the types of companies under each Sustainability Theme which may be suitable for the investment universe if they have sufficient revenue from their products and services which can demonstrate alignment to the goals of the SDGs.

Given the Investment Manager maps the Sustainable Themes at the UN SDG sub-target level, the indication below is not an exhaustive list of the relevant SDGs, nor of the types of the companies in which the Sub-fund may invest. The Investment Manager may alter the sub-themes and targets it considers from time to time, while remaining within the broader Sustainability Themes set out in the sustainable investment objective.

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Asset selection criteria

The Investment Manager uses the UN SDGs to define and monitor the Sustainability Themes and to identify the investment universe by using fundamental research, engagement and analysis.

The Investment Manager applies positive selection criteria, ESG integration and an exclusionary screen to determine the assets in which the Sub-fund may invest to ensure that all assets eventually selected by the Investment Manager have the relevant sustainability characteristics and are aligned with the objective.

Positive selection criteria

The degree of revenue alignment with one or more of the UN SDGs mapped to the Sustainability Themes is a key indicator for assessing the companies in which the Sub-fund may invest. No company deriving less than the minimum revenue threshold of 25% from UN SDG aligned activities is included within the investible universe.

The Investment Manager uses a proprietary process based on internal and external data and research to identify companies that meet this minimum threshold as detailed below:

1. Through proprietary research, the Investment Manager assesses the UN SDG sub-targets and identifies those that present opportunities for investment. The Investment Manager identifies a list of products and services that support the achievement of these sub-targets. These products and services are mapped by the Investment Manager to Sustainable Themes of Climate, Health, and Empowerment and additional sub-themes reflecting the UN SDG alignment methodology. Please see "Sustainability Standard" above for further details on the UN SDGs.

2. Using a mix of proprietary data science capabilities, external data and internal research by our analysts, companies assessed to generate at least 25% of their annual revenues from these UN SDG-aligned products and services are identified. The data science tools used reference publicly available data, such as annual reports and public filings, and allow the Investment Manager to cross-reference output from third-party sources to ensure data quality. Revenue data is also used to identify issuers generating revenue from products and services that inhibit the achievement of the UN SDGs as outlined in the Exclusion policy. The affected issuers are deemed 'misaligned' and uninvestible, leaving only 'Aligned' issuers in the investible universe.

ESG Integration

ESG risks and factors are integrated into the Investment Manager's research and investment processes through the AllianceBernstein Stewardship Approach.

The Investment Manager's research analysts focus on the specific industries, companies and issuers that they cover. Using their own proprietary research, third-party research and findings from other sources incorporated in the Investment Manager's research collaboration platform, they analyse companies' and issuers' ESG practices to identify potentially material ESG risks and opportunities.

ESG considerations are incorporated into the Investment Manager's research and investment process and are one of several considerations for making investment decisions, both in deciding to purchase the holding for the Sub-fund and, on an on-going basis, in deciding whether to retain the holding.

After consideration of material ESG factors, and corresponding ESG scoring, including those that could negatively impact a potential holding, the Investment Manager may still purchase the security and / or retain it in the Sub-fund. ESG considerations may not be applicable to all types of instruments or investments.

Material negative environmental and/or social outcomes: As a fund with a Sustainable Investment Objective, minimum thresholds, which represent the Investment Manager's interpretation of material negative environmental and/or social outcomes, are applied to each factor. If at any point a security is assessed to breach the threshold to assess for material negative environmental and / or social outcomes, the security will no longer be deemed to contribute towards the sustainability objective.

Exclusionary screen

Only 'aligned' issuers that satisfy the Investment Manager's inclusion criteria and do not breach the terms of the Sub-fund's Exclusion Policy (as explained below and detailed in Appendix 4 of the Prospectus) are contained within the investible universe.

Exclusion policy

All securities in the investible universe must also avoid involvement in misaligned activities as per the Sub-fund's Exclusion Policy, as stated in Appendix 4 of the Prospectus.

Companies invested in by the Sub-fund must derive a minimum of 25% of their revenue from the direct provisions of products or services that support the achievement of one or more UN SDGs. Activities assessed to negatively impact the achievement of the UN SDGs are excluded. Should a company positively contribute to one UN SDG but be misaligned with another, investment would not be permitted.

The Investment Manager's selection criteria include the consideration of ESG risks and opportunities in its fundamental research process, and when considering whether or not to invest in or sell particular shares.

The Investment Manager engages with companies as part of their fundamental research process and will continue to take an active stewardship role by engaging with companies and actively voting in relation to shares held by the Sub-fund once it has invested.

Other asset classes and broader investment management strategy

Investment in shares of companies can be direct or indirect (including common and preference shares, depositary receipts (securities issued by banks that represent company shares) and rights for shares). Indirect exposure may also be achieved by investing up to 10% of the Sub-fund's value in Collective Investment Schemes. Investment in Collective Investment Schemes may include other funds managed by the Investment Manager or its affiliates.

The Sub-fund will be diversified (investing in at least 30 companies).

The Sub-fund is actively managed meaning the Investment Manager uses their expertise to select investments to achieve the Sub-fund's objectives. The Investment Manager is not required to hold investments in each sustainable investment theme, and there is no limit on the weighting of investments across themes at any time.

The Sub-fund may also invest up to 10% of its value in money market instruments, deposits, cash and near cash.

The Sub-fund may also use derivatives for investment, efficient portfolio management or hedging purposes. Use of derivatives for investment purposes are limited to currency forwards used to gain exposure to global currencies.

Any investment in derivatives for efficient portfolio management and investment purposes is not intended to increase the Sub-fund's risk profile.

Stewardship

The Investment Manager is a signatory of the UK Stewardship Code 2020, published by the Financial Reporting Council. The Investment Manager engages with companies as part of their fundamental research process and will continue to take an active stewardship role by engaging with companies and actively voting in relation to shares held by the Sub-fund once it has invested.

Through engagements, the Investment Manager gathers insights and may actively encourage issuers to better address material ESG risks or take advantage of ESG opportunities in alignment with the Sub-fund's sustainability objective and any wider ESG risks or opportunities identified by the Investment Manager. The insights the Investment Manager gains helps it to promote company behaviour that is in the best interests of investors and their financial goals. Insights from engagements may also inform the Sub-fund's understanding of issuer alignment or misalignment to the UN SDGs. The Investment Manager may encourage action that can lead to better identification and management of risk and opportunities, strategy, operations, and ultimately, results. Insight and action drive the Investment Manager's ability to make decisions and generate enhanced risk-adjusted investment returns for its investors. As stewards of investor assets, the Investment Manager believes that proxy voting is a fundamental responsibility. The Investment Manager votes its active and passive shareholdings and unit holdings in accordance with its proprietary, publicly available Proxy Voting and Governance Policy:

Escalation plan

The Sub-fund has a minimum threshold of 25% UN SDG revenue alignment to define its investment universe and excludes companies involved in misaligned activities as per the Sub-fund's Exclusion Policy.

It is possible that a company that met the selection criteria at the time of purchase may subsequently fail to meet the eligibility criteria. On these occasions, which would be identified by the Investment Manager as a result of its ongoing monitoring of the portfolio, the relevant company will no longer be deemed to contribute towards the sustainability objective. We will then consider whether it remains eligible for inclusion in the portfolio.

The following examples detail scenarios where this might occur and the Investment Manager's associated escalation plan:

- A company falls below 25% UN SDG alignment and there are no mitigating temporary circumstances - the Investment Manager must endeavour to divest in a way that has minimal impact to the portfolio (subject to liquidity or external forces that don't allow divestment).
- A company falls below 25% UN SDG alignment due to mitigating temporary circumstances - the Investment Manager must document the mitigating circumstance of the passive breach and detail a plan by which the issuer will regain its eligibility within a reasonable timeframe. The plan must be presented to Investment Manager's oversight committee for review and approval.
- A company's third-party UN SDG alignment data falls below the 25% SDG alignment threshold but the Investment Manager assesses the aligned revenue meets the threshold based on proprietary research - the Investment Manager must document the proprietary research demonstrating the company to meet the minimum threshold of 25% UN SDG revenue alignment. The research must be presented to the Investment Manager's Oversight Committee for review and approval.
- Once a company is deemed ineligible based on involvement in misaligned activities as per the Sub-fund's Exclusion Policy - the Investment Manager must endeavour to divest in a way that has minimal impact to the Sub-fund (subject to liquidity or external forces that don't allow divestment). In considering whether a company is ineligible and should be divested, the Investment Manager will consider each circumstance on a case by case basis, taking into account third party and internal data, whether the misalignment is expected to be temporary or there are other mitigating factors, and whether it would be appropriate in the first instance to engage with the company.

In each of these cases, the Investment Manager will inform the ACD and provide details of the approach being taken.

Ongoing monitoring, KPIs and assurance

The Sub-fund's fundamental policy and related KPI is that each corporate issuer must derive at least 25% revenue from products or services that aligns with the achievement of one or more UN SDG sub targets and this minimum threshold of 25% is used, together with the other criteria specified above, to define the Sub-fund's investment universe.

The 25% minimum alignment to the UN SDGs allows the investable universe and portfolio to remain diversified and support environmental and / or social outcomes across sector, geography, theme and UN SDG alignment providing a broad range of possible investments against which the Investment Manager can apply its other ESG and financial investment criteria.

The Investment Manager monitors the UN SDG KPI as well as a number of sustainability criteria including but not limited to:

1. The degree of revenue alignment for each issuer to the UN SDGs to ensure each issuer meets the 25% minimum;
2. The weighted average UN SDG-revenue alignment for the Sub-fund;
3. The Sub-fund's allocation to each of Health, Climate, and Empowerment; and
4. The percentage of the Sub-fund's portfolio in compliance with the Sub-fund's exclusion policy.

The Investment Manager uses compliance systems to assist the monitoring of aforementioned information used in the investment process. These systems monitor the Sub-fund's portfolio on both a pre-trade and post-trade basis, and are administered either by the Portfolio Management Group (PMG) with oversight by others, or by departments independent of portfolio management, such as the Investment Manager's Client Guidelines Management (CGM) Group.

There is no third party assessment. The Investment Manager has a team of dedicated individuals whose role is the verification and assessment of whether a particular asset meets the applicable standard of sustainability. At the same time, the Investment Manager's Internal Audit team (which operates separately and independently of the investment team) has undertaken an independent assessment of the Sub-fund's approach to its sustainability standard. Where any changes are made to the investment team's process for determining the sustainability characteristics of a particular asset, the Internal Audit team will carry out a further assessment as necessary. The Internal Audit team will also carry out a periodic review of the sustainability standard to ensure it remains appropriate.

Investor Profile

The Sub-fund invests across a number of markets, regions and industry sectors with emphasis on building a diversified portfolio of shares in global companies aligned with the SDGs. The Sub-fund will therefore be suitable for investors looking to invest in sustainable global companies and who are also willing to accept a higher level of risk arising out of investment in potentially volatile shares in pursuit of higher returns over the longer term. As such the Sub-fund is not suitable for investors who are looking for capital preservation. The Sub-fund is also not suitable for investors who are looking for an investment solution that has a specified limit in capital loss or no capital loss. The Sub-fund is aimed at investors who will be able to hold the Sub-fund for at least 5 years.

Investment Review

For the 12-month period ending 28 February 2026, Class I Shares of the SVS AllianceBernstein Sustainable Global Equity Fund declined in absolute terms and underperformed the Benchmark, the MSCI ACWI, which returned 16.31% (net of fees and in GBP terms). Stock selection detracted from relative performance while sector selection was positive. Selection within technology and financials detracted the most. In contrast, selection within energy and an overweight to industrials contributed. In terms of individual stocks, the leading detractors were Alphabet Inc. (underweight), London Stock Exchange and Alcon. The top contributors were Cameco, Samsung Electronics and Flex.

We purchased STERIS, a high-quality healthcare provider of sterilization equipment for hospitals and other medical facilities. The company operates in a highly regulated market with few competitors. Its sterilization business follows a "razor/razor-blade" model, where initial instrument placements generate recurring revenue from consumables and services, supporting high-single-digit growth. Unlike other healthcare end markets, the environment for medical procedures remains robust, creating a favorable backdrop for sustained growth. We purchased a leading player in oncology, biopharmaceuticals and rare diseases. The company entered 2026 with a robust calendar of catalysts (clinical trial read-outs), with multiple promising opportunities that should increase the stock price. These trials are backed by a track record of smart trial design and disciplined lifecycle management, which should keep fundamentals compounding over time. We purchased a REIT company focused on healthcare infrastructure with an emphasis on senior housing, wellness housing, outpatient medical facilities and post-acute care properties across the US, Canada and UK. Its business model centers on acquiring, developing, owning and managing a portfolio of high-quality healthcare real-estate assets, particularly private-pay, needs-driven senior-housing communities.

We trimmed Flex on increased concerns about financing AI buildouts and to manage position size and related risk exposure following strong performance. Flex continues to trade at a discount to peers and the broader market, despite delivering consistent double-digit earnings growth over the past few years. We exited Alcon, an eye-care company specializing in pharmaceuticals and medical devices, following weak contact lens demand and sluggish results. Although Alcon's long-term innovation pipeline remains attractive, recent product launches struggled to gain traction. We continue to monitor adoption trends for new products and maintain active engagement with the company. We trimmed Cameco to manage position size and related risk exposure following strong performance, and because of its high correlation with the AI trade and rising concerns about financing AI buildouts.

Market Overview

Global equities, as measured by the MSCI World, rose during the 12-month period ended 28 February 2026. Global markets were volatile early in 2025 following US president Donald Trump's back-and-forth announcements on tariffs in April. After trade tensions eased, global stocks rallied over the summer, despite uncertainty over future Federal Reserve rate cuts. The Fed clarified its shifting focus to labor market weakness in August and subsequently lowered interest rates three times in the second half of 2025. Concerns over technology stock valuations, prompted by uncertainty over AI-related spending and potential disruption to enterprise software businesses, began to weigh on US markets at the end of 2025 as investors rotated into value-oriented sectors and non-US markets to diversify from large-cap technology. Many developed-market indices reached new all-time highs early in 2026, but a rise in geopolitical and trade-related tensions also increased volatility. Within large-cap markets, both growth and value stocks rose in absolute terms, with value outperforming on a relative basis. Both large- and small-cap stocks increased in absolute terms, with small caps outperforming on a relative basis.

Outlook

February saw further validation of the energy transition theme, particularly around nuclear power, as utilities increasingly sought long-term, geopolitically resilient fuel supply. Cameco announced a nine-year uranium supply agreement with India covering 2027–2035 and totaling 22 million pounds of uranium, a notable development as India pursues an ambitious plan to expand its nuclear generation more than tenfold by 2047. Beyond the immediate volume impact, the agreement underscores a broader shift by utilities toward secure Western supply chains and reinforces nuclear's role as a durable baseload solution within the global decarbonization and energy security framework.

Healthcare continues to see strengthening fundamentals and valuation backdrop. Earnings revisions have turned positive again, particularly across large-cap pharma and biotech, supported by broad earnings beats and steadily rising 2026 and 2027 consensus estimates. Despite this improvement, the sector continues to trade at a discount. Structural tailwinds remain intact, with AI services increasingly lowering research and development costs and expanding the number of viable development programs.

Our sentiment in AI remains selective as capital intensity continues to outpace visible monetization. Recent hyperscaler capital expenditure guidance reinforces the scale and durability of AI infrastructure investment, though market reactions suggest growing skepticism around the timing and breadth of returns, particularly outside a narrow set of beneficiaries. In this environment, positioning remains fragile and asymmetric, with limited reward for positive news and sharp penalties for disappointment, reinforcing a preference for exposure where demand visibility is clearest and execution risk is best understood.

We're encouraged that our themes continue to demonstrate fundamental resilience and deliver earnings growth that consistently outpaces the broader market. We remain focused on identifying companies that are not only on the right side of change but also demonstrate strong earnings power and disciplined capital allocation. We believe the Fund is well positioned to capitalize on these secular tailwinds.

To achieve an increase in the value of its investment over a rolling 5 year period after the deduction of all fees.

Sustainability Objective

The Sub-fund's sustainability objective is to positively contribute to environmental and social challenges, by investing in companies that provide solutions to the Sub-fund's sustainability themes (together the "Sustainability Themes") of:

- Climate – companies providing solutions to key global climate objectives including lower carbon emissions, biodiversity and resource preservation, and reduced pollution;
- Health – companies providing solutions to key global health objectives including improved life expectancy, greater health-related quality of life, and reduced disparities of care; and / or
- Empowerment – companies that enable greater economic growth and productivity which may help individuals enjoy more prosperous and fulfilling lives through the provision of solutions which include widening access to previously inaccessible financial systems, communication systems, education and the development of critical social and physical infrastructure.

The Sub-fund seeks to contribute to these fundamental challenges by investing in companies that have revenue assessed to be aligned to one or more of the UN Sustainable Development Goals (UN SDGs) identified by the Investment Manager as contributing to the achievement of the Sustainability Themes.

Material effects of sustainability objective on financial objective or sustainability outcomes

While the Sub-fund's investment strategy may result in a narrower investment universe compared to a fund without a similar sustainability objective, the Investment Manager does not believe that this will have a material effect on the financial risk and return of the Sub-fund or on the Sub-fund's ability to meet its financial investment objective.

The Investment Manager does not consider that pursuing the Sub-fund's sustainability objective will result in material negative environmental and / or social outcomes. While the Investment Manager pursues positive selection criteria, negative environmental and/or social outcomes are mitigated through a number of methodologies:

- The Investment Manager may not invest in a company in the Sub-fund's Exclusion Policy as stated in Appendix 4 of the Prospectus.
- The Investment Manager applies a proprietary framework to assess for material negative environmental and / or social outcomes as explained in "ESG Integration" below.
- The Investment Manager's selection criteria also includes the consideration of ESG risks and opportunities in its fundamental research process as explained in "ESG Integration" below.

The Investment Manager engages with companies as part of their fundamental research process as detailed in "Stewardship" below.

Investment Policy**Primary investment policy**

The Sub-fund seeks to achieve its financial and sustainable investment objectives by investing at least 80% of the Sub-fund's total value in shares of US companies that the Investment Manager has identified as positively contributing to the Sustainability Themes.

This positive contribution requires that companies generate at least 25% of their revenue from the direct provision of products or services aligned with Sustainability Themes, as measured against one or more of the UN SDGs (as detailed below).

The Sub-fund may from time to time also invest (in addition to the 80% investment in Climate, Health and/or Empowerment) in other UN SDG-linked sustainable themes identified through the same methodology. The Sustainability Themes may change over time, and investors will be notified should this occur.

Sustainability standard

What sustainability standard does the Sub-fund use to select assets?

The robust, evidence based standard of sustainability used by the Sub-fund for the purposes of asset selection is a 25% revenue alignment to the UN SDGs.

The UN SDGs comprise 17 goals, broken down into 169 specific sub-targets designed to address key global social and environmental issues. Further information on the UN SDGs can be found at <https://sdgs.un.org/>.

The Investment Manager uses the UN SDGs (and their sub-targets) as the framework for the Sub-fund's absolute standard of sustainability by:

- identifying companies with a UN SDG revenue alignment verifiably mapped to one or more of the Sustainability Themes (as further detailed below); and
- ensuring that no company deriving less than a minimum revenue threshold of 25% from UN SDG aligned activities is included within the investible universe.

Why is this standard of sustainability considered to be appropriate for the Fund?

The UN SDGs were chosen as the basis of the robust evidence-based standard as they directly target the themes specified in the Sub-fund's sustainability objective.

Further, the UN SDGs were adopted by all UN Member States in 2015 and are one of the most internationally recognised and accepted standards and measures of sustainability, and a standard which can be applied consistently across the Sub-fund's main asset class of global equities. Further, the UN SDGs are interconnected, apply to all countries, and require action by all stakeholders – governments, the private sector, civil society, the United Nations system and others.

As a multi-theme portfolio, the 25% threshold for revenue alignment enables the Sub-fund to access a diversified range of companies which might otherwise be inaccessible at a higher revenue threshold. The Investment Manager has determined as a result of its internal research that a minimum revenue percentage of 25% is appropriate on the basis that companies with at least 25% revenue alignment have sufficient management focus on the UN SDG-aligned area of their business to allow them to consistently deliver in line with the Sub-fund's sustainability objective.

This allows for investment into a broader range of themes to include products and services such as emerging technologies or essential services such as access to financial products or food packaging.

How does the Investment Manager map the Sustainability Themes to the UN SDGs?

The Investment Manager assesses and maps the Sustainability Themes against the detailed 169 sub-targets of the UN SDGs, and the Sustainability Themes are therefore not limited to being measured or assessed against any one of the main 17 UN SDGs.

Each of the Sustainability Themes may encompass one or more of the main 17 UN SDGs, and the UN SDGs under consideration in respect of a particular theme may change over time.

As an indication for investors, the following mapping demonstrates the Investment Manager's consideration of how the Sustainability Themes may map to the UN SDGs, together with some examples of the types of companies under each Sustainability Theme which may be suitable for the investment universe if they have sufficient revenue from their products and services which can demonstrate alignment to the goals of the SDGs.

Given the Investment Manager maps the Sustainable Themes at the UN SDG sub-target level, the indication below is not an exhaustive list of the relevant SDGs, nor of the types of the companies in which the Sub-fund may invest. The Investment Manager may alter the sub-themes and targets it considers from time to time, while remaining within the broader Sustainability Themes set out in the sustainable investment objective.

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Asset selection criteria

The Investment Manager uses the UN SDGs to define and monitor the Sustainability Themes and to identify the investment universe by using fundamental research, engagement and analysis.

The Investment Manager applies positive selection criteria, ESG integration and an exclusionary screen to determine the assets in which the Sub-fund may invest to ensure that all assets eventually selected by the Investment Manager have the relevant sustainability characteristics and are aligned with the objective.

Positive selection criteria

The degree of revenue alignment with one or more of the UN SDGs mapped to the Sustainability Themes is a key indicator for assessing the companies in which the Sub-fund may invest. No company deriving less than the minimum revenue threshold of 25% from UN SDG aligned activities is included within the investible universe.

The Investment Manager uses a proprietary process based on internal and external data and research to identify companies that meet this minimum threshold as detailed below:

1. Through proprietary research, the Investment Manager assesses the UN SDG sub-targets and identifies those that present opportunities for investment. The Investment Manager identifies a list of products and services that support the achievement of these sub-targets. These products and services are mapped by the Investment Manager to Sustainable Themes of Climate, Health, and Empowerment and additional sub-themes reflecting the UN SDG alignment methodology. Please see "Sustainability Standard" above for further details on the UN SDGs.

2. Using a mix of proprietary data science capabilities, external data and internal research by our analysts, companies assessed to generate at least 25% of their annual revenues from these UN SDG-aligned products and services are identified. The data science tools used reference publicly available data, such as annual reports and public filings, and allow the Investment Manager to cross-reference output from third-party sources to ensure data quality. Revenue data is also used to identify issuers generating revenue from products and services that inhibit the achievement of the UN SDGs as outlined in the Exclusion policy. The affected issuers are deemed 'misaligned' and uninvestible, leaving only 'Aligned' issuers in the investible universe.

ESG Integration

ESG risks and factors are integrated into the Investment Manager's research and investment processes through the AllianceBernstein Stewardship Approach.

The Investment Manager's research analysts focus on the specific industries, companies and issuers that they cover. Using their own proprietary research, third-party research and findings from other sources incorporated in the Investment Manager's research collaboration platform, they analyse companies' and issuers' ESG practices to identify potentially material ESG risks and opportunities.

ESG considerations are incorporated into the Investment Manager's research and investment process and are one of several considerations for making investment decisions, both in deciding to purchase the holding for the Sub-fund and, on an on-going basis, in deciding whether to retain the holding.

After consideration of material ESG factors, and corresponding ESG scoring, including those that could negatively impact a potential holding, the Investment Manager may still purchase the security and / or retain it in the Sub-fund. ESG considerations may not be applicable to all types of instruments or investments.

Material negative environmental and/or social outcomes: As a fund with a Sustainable Investment Objective, minimum thresholds, which represent the Investment Manager's interpretation of material negative environmental and/or social outcomes, are applied to each factor. If at any point a security is assessed to breach the threshold to assess for material negative environmental and / or social outcomes, the security will no longer be deemed to contribute towards the sustainability objective.

Exclusionary screen

Only 'aligned' issuers that satisfy the Investment Manager's inclusion criteria and do not breach the terms of the Sub-fund's Exclusion Policy (as explained below and detailed in Appendix 4 of the Prospectus) are contained within the investible universe.

Exclusion policy

All securities in the investible universe must also avoid involvement in misaligned activities as per the Sub-fund's Exclusion Policy, as stated in Appendix 4 of the Prospectus.

Companies invested in by the Sub-fund must derive a minimum of 25% of their revenue from the direct provisions of products or services that support the achievement of one or more UN SDGs. Activities assessed to negatively impact the achievement of the UN SDGs are excluded. Should a company positively contribute to one UN SDG but be misaligned with another, investment would not be permitted.

The Investment Manager's selection criteria include the consideration of ESG risks and opportunities in its fundamental research process, and when considering whether or not to invest in or sell particular shares.

The Investment Manager engages with companies as part of their fundamental research process and will continue to take an active stewardship role by engaging with companies and actively voting in relation to shares held by the Sub-fund once it has invested.

Other asset classes and broader investment management strategy

Investment in shares of companies can be direct or indirect (including common and preference shares, depositary receipts (securities issued by banks that represent company shares) and rights for shares). Indirect exposure may also be achieved by investing up to 10% of the Sub-fund's value in Collective Investment Schemes. Investment in Collective Investment Schemes may include other funds managed by the Investment Manager or its affiliates.

The Sub-fund will be diversified (investing in at least 30 companies).

The Sub-fund is actively managed meaning the Investment Manager uses their expertise to select investments to achieve the Sub-fund's objectives. The Investment Manager is not required to hold investments in each sustainable investment theme, and there is no limit on the weighting of investments across themes at any time.

Investment Manager's Report

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The Sub-fund may also invest up to 20% of its value in money market instruments, deposits, cash and near cash.

The Sub-fund may also use derivatives for hedging purposes. Any investment in derivatives for hedging purposes is not intended to increase the Sub-fund's risk profile.

Stewardship

The Investment Manager is a signatory of the UK Stewardship Code 2020, published by the Financial Reporting Council. The Investment Manager engages with companies as part of their fundamental research process and will continue to take an active stewardship role by engaging with companies and actively voting in relation to shares held by the Sub-fund once it has invested.

Through engagements, the Investment Manager gathers insights and may actively encourage issuers to better address material ESG risks or take advantage of ESG opportunities in alignment with the Sub-fund's sustainability objective and any wider ESG risks or opportunities identified by the Investment Manager. The insights the Investment Manager gains helps it to promote company behaviour that is in the best interests of investors and their financial goals. Insights from engagements may also inform the Sub-fund's understanding of issuer alignment or misalignment to the UN SDGs. The Investment Manager may encourage action that can lead to better identification and management of risk and opportunities, strategy, operations, and ultimately, results. Insight and action drive the Investment Manager's ability to make decisions and generate enhanced risk-adjusted investment returns for its investors.

As stewards of investor assets, the Investment Manager believes that proxy voting is a fundamental responsibility. The Investment Manager votes its active and passive shareholdings and unit holdings in accordance with its proprietary, publicly available Proxy Voting and Governance Policy: <https://www.alliancebernstein.com/content/dam/corporate/corporate-pdfs/AB-Proxy-Voting-and-Governance-Policy.pdf>.

Escalation plan

The Sub-fund has a minimum threshold of 25% UN SDG revenue alignment to define its investment universe and excludes companies involved in misaligned activities as per the Sub-fund's Exclusion Policy.

It is possible that a company that met the selection criteria at the time of purchase may subsequently fail to meet the eligibility criteria. On these occasions, which would be identified by the Investment Manager as a result of its ongoing monitoring of the portfolio, the relevant company will no longer be deemed to contribute towards the sustainability objective. We will then consider whether it remains eligible for inclusion in the portfolio.

The following examples detail scenarios where this might occur and the Investment Manager's associated escalation plan:

- A company falls below 25% UN SDG alignment and there are no mitigating temporary circumstances - the Investment Manager must endeavour to divest in a way that has minimal impact to the portfolio (subject to liquidity or external forces that don't allow divestment).
- A company falls below 25% UN SDG alignment due to mitigating temporary circumstances - the Investment Manager must document the mitigating circumstance of the passive breach and detail a plan by which the issuer will regain its eligibility within a reasonable timeframe. The plan must be presented to Investment Manager's oversight committee for review and approval.
- A company's third-party UN SDG alignment data falls below the 25% SDG alignment threshold but the Investment Manager assesses the aligned revenue meets the threshold based on proprietary research - the Investment Manager must document the proprietary research demonstrating the company to meet the minimum threshold of 25% UN SDG revenue alignment. The research must be presented to the Investment Manager's Oversight Committee for review and approval.
- Once a company is deemed ineligible based on involvement in misaligned activities as per the Sub-fund's Exclusion Policy - the Investor Manager must endeavour to divest in a way that has minimal impact to the Sub-fund (subject to liquidity or external forces that don't allow divestment). In considering whether a company is ineligible and should be divested, the Investment Manager will consider each circumstance on a case by case basis, taking into account third party and internal data, whether the misalignment is expected to be temporary or there are other mitigating factors, and whether it would be appropriate in the first instance to engage with the company.

In each of these cases, the Investment Manager will inform the ACD and provide details of the approach being taken.

Investment Manager's Report

Ongoing monitoring, KPIs and assurance

The Sub-fund's fundamental policy and related KPI is that each corporate issuer must derive at least 25% revenue from products or services that aligns with the achievement of one or more UN SDG sub targets and this minimum threshold of 25% is used, together with the other criteria specified above, to define the Sub-fund's investment universe.

The 25% minimum alignment to the UN SDGs allows the investable universe and portfolio to remain diversified and support environmental and / or social outcomes across sector, geography, theme and UN SDG alignment providing a broad range of possible investments against which the Investment Manager can apply its other ESG and financial investment criteria.

The Investment Manager monitors the UN SDG KPI as well as a number of sustainability criteria including but not limited to:

1. The degree of revenue alignment for each issuer to the UN SDGs to ensure each issuer meets the 25% minimum;
2. The weighted average UN SDG-revenue alignment for the Sub-fund;
3. The Sub-fund's allocation to each of Health, Climate, and Empowerment; and
4. The percentage of the Sub-fund's portfolio in compliance with the Sub-fund's exclusion policy.

The Investment Manager uses compliance systems to assist the monitoring of aforementioned information used in the investment process. These systems monitor the Sub-fund's portfolio on both a pre-trade and post-trade basis, and are administered either by the Portfolio Management Group (PMG) with oversight by others, or by departments independent of portfolio management, such as the Investment Manager's Client Guidelines Management (CGM) Group.

There is no third party assessment. The Investment Manager has a team of dedicated individuals whose role is the verification and assessment of whether a particular asset meets the applicable standard of sustainability. At the same time, the Investment Manager's Internal Audit team (which operates separately and independently of the investment team) has undertaken an independent assessment of the Sub-fund's approach to its sustainability standard. Where any changes are made to the investment team's process for determining the sustainability characteristics of a particular asset, the Internal Audit team will carry out a further assessment as necessary. The Internal Audit team will also carry out a periodic review of the sustainability standard to ensure it remains appropriate.

Investor Profile

The Sub-fund invests in a single market with emphasis on a diversified portfolio of shares in US companies aligned with the SDGs. The Sub-fund will therefore be suitable for investors looking to invest in sustainable US companies and who are also willing to accept a higher level of risk arising out of investment in potentially volatile shares in pursuit of higher returns over the longer term. As such the Sub-fund is not suitable for investors who are looking for capital preservation. The Sub-fund is also not suitable for investors who are looking for an investment solution that has a specified limit in capital loss or no capital loss. The Sub-fund is aimed at investors who will be able to hold the Sub-fund for at least 5 years.

Investment Review

For the 12-month period ending 28 February 2026, Class I Shares of the SVS AllianceBernstein Sustainable US Equity Fund increased in absolute terms but underperformed the Benchmark, the S&P 500, which returned 9.15% (net of fees and in GBP terms). Stock selection detracted from relative performance while sector selection was positive. Selection within financials and technology detracted the most. In contrast, selection within energy and an overweight to industrials contributed. In terms of individual stocks, the leading detractors were Alphabet Inc. (underweight), Salesforce and ServiceNow. The top contributors were Cameco, Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing and Flex.

We purchased Alphabet Inc. as the fundamentals increasingly warrant ownership of the stock. The company's core search business is reaccelerating, and its Gemini AI models are competing effectively while being trained on its own low cost TPU chips, which provides a cost advantage in model development. Apple finalized a deal to use Gemini to power its upcoming product upgrades. Upside catalysts include additional customers for its TPU chips and broader adoption of Gemini within Apple's ecosystem and across other potential customers. We purchased STERIS, a high-quality healthcare provider of sterilization equipment for hospitals and other medical facilities. The company operates in a highly regulated market with few competitors. Its sterilization business follows a "razor/razor-blade" model, where initial instrument placements generate recurring revenue from consumables and services, supporting high-single-digit growth. Unlike other healthcare end markets, the environment for medical procedures remains robust, creating a favorable backdrop for sustained growth. We purchased a REIT company focused on healthcare infrastructure with an emphasis on senior housing, wellness housing, outpatient medical facilities and post-acute care properties across the US, Canada and UK. Its business model centers on acquiring, developing, owning and managing a portfolio of high-quality healthcare real-estate assets, particularly private-pay, needs-driven senior-housing communities.

Investment Manager's Report

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We trimmed Flex on increased concerns about financing AI buildouts and to manage position size and related risk exposure following strong performance. Flex continues to trade at a discount to peers and the broader market, despite delivering consistent double-digit earnings growth over the past few years. We trimmed Broadcom as part of a continued effort to decrease AI exposure, citing concerns about potential overbuilding and anticipated increased market volatility related to noise and stock performance. We trimmed Cameco to manage position size and related risk exposure following strong performance, and because of its high correlation with the AI trade and rising concerns about financing AI buildouts.

Market Overview

US equities, as measured by the S&P 500, rose during the 12-month period that ended on 28 February 2026. Global markets were volatile early in 2025 following US president Donald Trump's back-and-forth announcements on tariffs in April. After trade tensions eased, global stocks rallied over the summer, despite uncertainty over future Federal Reserve rate cuts. The Fed clarified its shifting focus to labor market weakness in August and subsequently lowered interest rates three times in the second half of 2025. Concerns over technology stock valuations, prompted by uncertainty over AI-related spending and potential disruption to enterprise-software businesses, began to weigh on US markets at the end of 2025 as investors rotated into value-oriented sectors and non-US markets to diversify from large-cap technology. Many developed-market indices reached new all-time highs early in 2026, but a rise in geopolitical and trade-related tensions also increased volatility. Within large-cap markets, both growth and value stocks rose in absolute terms, with value outperforming on a relative basis. Both large- and small-cap stocks increased in absolute terms, with small caps outperforming on a relative basis.

Outlook

February saw further validation of the energy transition theme, particularly around nuclear power, as utilities increasingly sought long-term, geopolitically resilient fuel supply. Cameco announced a nine-year uranium supply agreement with India covering 2027–2035 and totaling 22 million pounds of uranium, a notable development as India pursues an ambitious plan to expand its nuclear generation more than tenfold by 2047. Beyond the immediate volume impact, the agreement underscores a broader shift by utilities toward secure Western supply chains and reinforces nuclear's role as a durable baseload solution within the global decarbonization and energy security framework.

Healthcare continues to see strengthening fundamentals and valuation backdrop. Earnings revisions have turned positive again, particularly across large-cap pharma and biotech, supported by broad earnings beats and steadily rising 2026 and 2027 consensus estimates. Despite this improvement, the sector continues to trade at a discount. Structural tailwinds remain intact, with AI services increasingly lowering research and development costs and expanding the number of viable development programs.

Our sentiment in AI remains selective as capital intensity continues to outpace visible monetization. Recent hyperscaler capital expenditure guidance reinforces the scale and durability of AI infrastructure investment, though market reactions suggest growing skepticism around the timing and breadth of returns, particularly outside a narrow set of beneficiaries. In this environment, positioning remains fragile and asymmetric, with limited reward for positive news and sharp penalties for disappointment, reinforcing a preference for exposure where demand visibility is clearest and execution risk is best understood.

We're encouraged that our themes continue to demonstrate fundamental resilience and deliver earnings growth that consistently outpaces the broader market. We remain focused on identifying companies that are not only on the right side of change but also demonstrate strong earnings power and disciplined capital allocation. We believe the Fund is well positioned to capitalize on these secular tailwinds.

Investment Objective

To achieve an increase in the value of its investment over a rolling 5 year period after the deduction of all fees, through an actively managed portfolio of global bonds denominated in, or hedged back to, Sterling.

Investment Policy

The Sub-fund seeks to achieve its investment objective by investing at least 80% of the Sub-Fund's total value in global bonds.

The Sub-fund will invest flexibly across different bond securities, investing in government and corporate bond issuers, investment grade and sub-investment grade bonds, and in bonds issued in any country (including Emerging Market Countries) in any currency. The Sub-Fund may invest in asset and mortgage backed securities.

The Sub-fund will have a minimum exposure of 80% of its value to Sterling, either directly or indirectly, at any given time.

The Sub-fund is actively managed meaning that the Investment Manager uses their expertise to select investment to achieve the Sub-Fund's objective.

The Investment Manager will include, as part of its overall investment process, Environmental, Social, and Governance ("ESG") factors when considering whether or not to invest in or sell a particular bond. The Investment Manager is not restricted by the Investment Policy from holding a particular issuer, unless the issuer is identified in accordance with the Sub-Fund's Exclusion Policy as stated in Appendix 4 of the Prospectus.

The Sub-fund may also invest up to 20% of its value in money markets instruments, deposits, cash and near cash, and up to 10% of its value in Collective Investment Schemes (including other funds managed by the Investment Manager).

The Sub-fund may use derivatives for Hedging, EPM, and Investment Purposes.

Investment Review

From 28 May 2025 through 28 February 2026, Class I shares of the SVS AllianceBernstein Strategic Bond Fund* increased in absolute terms and outperformed the Benchmark, the Bloomberg Global Aggregate Index (GBP hedged), which was up 5.57% (net of fees and in GBP terms). The Fund is strategically positioned for a low-growth environment, while maintaining flexibility to adjust positions quickly during times of market stress. During the period, the Fund maintained a duration underweight, which benefited performance given yield volatility. Within credit sectors, the Fund focuses on high-quality assets, with allocations primarily in investment-grade corporate bonds, complemented by diversified exposures in high-yield corporate bonds and securitized assets. An overweight in credit risk proved advantageous, as credit spreads tightened and credit markets remained resilient despite ongoing tariff and geopolitical risks. Security selection within the banking and energy industries further contributed to relative returns. Additionally, an off-Benchmark allocation to high-yield corporate bonds provided a boost to performance. These positioning and allocation choices reflect the Fund's disciplined approach to risk management, emphasizing sectors and issuers with resilience in the face of fiscal and political challenges, while opportunistically seeking sources of outperformance through selective sector and security exposures.

Market Overview

Fixed-income government bond market yields were volatile as investors adjusted their expectations for US tariffs, inflation, economic growth, deficits and central bank decisions. Developed-market (DM) yields generally fell during most of the period. Government bond returns rose in aggregate. Returns were the highest in New Zealand, Switzerland, Italy and the UK, and fell in Japan. Overall, DM investment-grade corporate bonds rose and outperformed government bonds, as corporates outperformed treasuries in the eurozone and the US. DM high-yield corporate bonds advanced and solidly outperformed treasury markets, particularly in the eurozone and US. Emerging-market (EM) hard-currency sovereign bonds outperformed DM treasuries by a significant margin, mainly due to the strong performance of high-yield sovereigns. EM hard-currency corporate bonds overall also had solid results, again boosted by high-yield corporates. EM local-currency bonds outperformed other credit risk sectors as the US dollar fell against all DM currencies except the yen, and most EM currencies over the period.

Investment Manager's Report

Outlook

Economic data continue to suggest stability in most major economies. In particular, recent improving US labor market data should keep the US Federal Reserve on hold for the time being. US inflation remains sticky and above target, but unless and until it accelerates, we continue to expect the Fed's next rate move will be a cut later this year. We believe the policy rate is still slightly above neutral and that, in the steady-state US economy we expect, the Fed will want to get its rate back to neutral over time. Financial markets are wrestling with the implications of AI, leading to equity market volatility. With inflation stable, however, fixed income has resumed its negative return correlation with equities, enabling it to help stabilize balanced investment portfolios once again. While the US Supreme Court has overruled one legal justification for tariffs, we expect the administration to find other legal rationales for keeping the tariff regime largely in place. The onset of hostilities between the US and Iran bears close watching. If the spike in oil prices extends and persists, it could disrupt the global economy.

We believe economic activity is set to improve in the eurozone, as the periphery continues to outperform and Germany works to revive its economic model. The European Central Bank believes that, though inflation is undershooting its target, the shortfall is temporary. Accordingly, the ECB's Governing Council remains comfortable keeping rates on hold, and events in the Middle East will likely reinforce that stance. Base effects will help lower UK inflation close to target in the second quarter. Though inflation will likely rise again in the second half of the year, the disinflationary trend should continue. Stickiness in underlying price pressures should also ease but will keep the Bank of England cautious when cutting rates. We expect three quarterly cuts this year.

The remuneration committee report contained in the Group Report and Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2024 includes details on the remuneration policy. The remuneration committee comprises three independent non-executive directors¹ and is governed by formal terms of reference, which are reviewed and agreed by the board. The committee met seven times during 2024.

Remuneration policy

The main principles of the remuneration policy are:

- aligns the interests of employees with those of our clients/customers and investors;
- is compliant with relevant regulation and considers market best practice;
- is pragmatic, flexible, economic, and considers the commercial objectives of the business;
- is competitive and helps the Group attract and retain talented people;
- encourages behaviours consistent with the Group's values, ambitions, strategy, and risk appetite (including environmental, social and governance risk factors);
- supports the delivery of fair outcomes for our clients; and
- is clear, fair, free from bias and based on objective criteria that avoids discrimination (including gender).

Remuneration systems

Fixed pay is determined by considering an employee's role and responsibilities, external market information, and internal budgets/affordability. The remuneration committee considers all of these factors when determining appropriate salary/fixed profit share budgets as part of the annual pay review, and by exception any increases outside of the annual pay review.

Evelyn Partners operates Discretionary Incentive Plans (DIP) – these are discretionary bonus schemes that enable employees to be recognised for their hard work and commitment, through linking reward to the performance and outcomes, including client outcomes, of both the business and the individual employee.

Bonus awards under a DIP are made in cash and/or equity awards and are driven by the following factors:

- The financial performance (primarily EBITDA performance) of the business;
- An employee's individual performance in relation to the Group's key performance indicators and financial outcomes;
- An employee's individual performance in relation to behaviours which are in line with the Group's values, which includes client outcomes and regulatory compliance; and
- A risk and control review, which includes client outcomes.

Aggregate quantitative information

The total amount of remuneration paid by Evelyn Partners Fund Solutions Limited ('EPFL') is nil as EPFL has no employees. However, a number of employees have remuneration costs recharged to EPFL and the annualised remuneration for these 70 employees is £3.58 million of which £3.19 million is fixed remuneration. This is based on the salary and benefits for those identified as working in EPFL as at 31 December 2024. Any variable remuneration is awarded for the year ended 31 December 2024. This information excludes any senior management or other Material Risk Takers (MRTs) whose remuneration information is detailed below.

Evelyn Partners Group Limited reviews its MRTs at least annually. These individuals are employed by and provide services to other companies in the Group. It is difficult to apportion remuneration for these individuals in respect of their duties to EPFL. For this reason, the aggregate total remuneration awarded for the year 31 December 2024 for senior management and other MRTs detailed below has not been apportioned.
